As a member of the COMGA Board I've often been asked: how is the Central Oregon Master Gardeners Association related to OSU's Master Gardeners? Can you be one and not the other? Why do the Master Gardeners need a second

I've heard a number of explanations but since I'm a visual learner, I'm going to try to describe the OSU – COMGA relationship through a gardener's eyes.

As we all know, Amy Jo Detweiler, Central Oregon's OSU Horticulture Agent, develops a series of classes every year to train people interested in understanding horticulture in depth. Her motive for educating gardeners is to have a team of volunteers willing to help the general public with their gardening questions and problems. You might think of these volunteers at the end of their training as little seeds, packed with potential and just waiting for the right conditions to grow.



With our training, we newly sown Master Gardeners also need to earn some experience: doing research into garden questions, assisting the public, teaching good horticulture practices and promoting the OSU Extension Service programs. The little seeds will need to be started in good conditions to grow into productive volunteers – but how?



The Central Oregon OSU Horticulture Agent is a busy person, serving the commercial needs of three counties while supervising the Master Gardener Program. It's a big task to nurture those little seeds into sturdy plants. That's where the **Oregon Master Gardener Association** steps in.

7:30 manage customer line for the plant sale, this would be needed until the line is gone, approx. 11:00.

A beautiful early spring bloomer with an interesting derived name _ Grass Widow

Grass widows (see picture below) are one of the earliest blooming wildflowers in Oregon appearing in the Columbia gorge as early as mid February. Elsewhere they are scattered throughout the state in spring/early summer in rocky vernal wet places that later dry. A member of the Iris family (Iridaceae) *Olysnium douglasii* is the only species in the genus in North America where it's native range spans British Columbia to California. Grass widows are perennial bulbiferous plants reaching only about six inches in height. The petals and sepals form a bell shaped flower, bright purple rarely white in color. The leaves are grass like hence the common name. According to Michael Quinion, a british language expert, the common name refers to a mistress or unmarried woman who is left stranded by her lover in the grass after a tryst.

LOWDOWN FROM THE BOARD

February 6, 2020
(transcribed from audio)

Deschutes County Extension Office

MEMBERS PRESENT: Nancy Glick (President), Elizabeth Hughes Weide (VP-Community Education), Vickie Minor (Secretary), Tim Schindele (Treasurer), Mimi Thomas (Historian), Janet Dart (OMGA State Representative), Diana Hardin (Alternate State Representative), Rocky Bessette (Communications Liaison), Jolene Dodge (Membership Coordinator), Karen Finney, Liz Douville, JoAnne Abbott, Kirstin Hinton, Carroll Minium, Vicky Kemp, Phil Paterno, Toni Stephan, Lea Dahlen, Marissa Wright, Ruth Mulligan, and Gina Evans.

The meeting started at 1:00 PM and adjourned at 3:00 PM.

The board discussed the following items:

Approval of minutes of previous meeting (Nancy Glick)
Motion to approve the minutes made by Diana Hardin, seconded by Jolene Dodge, approved by the board.

OSU Report (Amy Jo Detweiler/Toni Stephan) Toni reported that the schedule for plant clinic will be coming out soon. She expects the certified MGs will start April 6 in the afternoons only and April 8 will be in Crook County only. Trainees will go through procedures training, then actual plant clinic training before they schedule other shifts. The MG classes are going well, with one more class left. There are 39 trainees and 3 transfers. The transferring MGs will go through the plant clinic procedures training. Everyone enjoyed the COMGA welcome luncheon and Toni talked about the challenges of having the training on Wednesdays instead of Fridays.

BOARD REPORTS:

Treasurer's Report (Tim Schindele) Based on the financial review, Tim changed the format of the treasurer's report to reflect the PayPal fees. The information will be in the "Note" box near the bottom of the report. Beginning this month, we expect significant PayPal activity because of Spring Seminar registrations. There were \$98.48 in contributions in February: \$52.82 from Renee's Garden, \$25.32 from the Fred Meyer Rewards program, \$15.54 from Amazon Smiles and a \$5 miscellaneous donation. We spent \$117.74 on MG Kitchen supplies, which is over the budgeted amount. The expenses covered unexpected costs of providing coffee service and eating utensils for the new MG training class. We will adjust the budget expense projection next year. Tim also reviewed the purchase of two new coffee urns for the MG classes, which were unplanned expenses this year. The old urn had been stored in the shed, which was infested with rodents. COMGA covers the cost of coffee and tea for the new training class and not knowing the condition of the old urn, two smaller, more practical urns were purchased. The old urn has since been cleaned and sanitized and is available for large events. Because the purchase was outside the scope of the current budget, Diana Hardin moved to use Opportunity Funds to cover the purchase of two coffee urns, for classes and other events. The motion was seconded by Elizabeth Weide, and was approved now, for then, by the board.

Membership Report (Jolene Dodge) 92 people noted their intent to recertify and to date, there are 75 paid COMGA members. There was a brief discussion on the "county fairs" option on the dues form and Diana Hardin

offered to manage the mobile plant clinic at the Deschutes County Fair.

Quarterly Meeting (Nancy Glick for Liz Anderson) 28 people attended the February 11 webinar on "Bees in the Garden: Update from the OSU Garden Ecology Lab." The first quarterly meeting will be March 14 at Liz Anderson's home in Powell Butte. Toni and Rocky will teach a pruning class, approved for one hour of advanced training, with a potluck to follow. The "Hanging Basket Planting Party" at Desert Dreams Gardens in Bend will be April 11. Information on signing up will be in the HoeDown. Gary Weber will teach a "Cloche Building" class, approved for one hour of advanced training, on April 28 at Discovery Park Community Garden in Bend. The second quarterly meeting will be June 20 and will include advanced training on "Grow A Little Fruit Tree," location and time to be announced. The July 2 board meeting will be at trainee Lainie Devina's home in Bend. The August 6 board meeting will be at Liz Anderson's house in Powell Butte, and the annual BBQ, elections and third quarterly meeting will be at Kris Knoernschild's home in Tumalo. The general meeting and budget approval will be in October, and the holiday brunch will be December 3.

OMGA Rep Report (Janet Dart) The first quarter OMGA meeting is this weekend but given the situation with the COVID-19 virus, Janet will not be attending. However, she shared the highlights from the Executive Committee meeting. Mini-College is scheduled for July 24-25, 2020 in Corvallis. Early registration fees are \$49/day until July 1, \$59/day after that date. Several tours and events are in the works; stay tuned for more information. Workshops for chapter treasurers will be held at the Educational Forums in September and November. Gail Langelotto sent a report on several areas, including a census she plans to do in 2020, to assess the demographics of the Master Gardener volunteers. She encouraged everyone to participate.

Policy and Procedure Review (Nancy Glick) A committee to review our Policies and Procedures has been formed, with Jan Even as chairperson. Policies being reviewed or added include awards, property/asset inventory and the newly approved tech committee.

ACTION ITEMS:

Summer Meetings (Nancy Glick) The June, July and August meetings are in the evening and Nancy is still looking for someone to host the June meeting. Contact her if you are interested.

Project Review (Nancy Glick) Product sales (row cover and soil thermometers) are being reviewed this year. Eileen Obermiller (chairperson), Carroll Minium, Nancy Crossan and Bruce Dart will do the review. The work is expected to be completed by August, in time for budget requests to be made.

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LOWDOWN FROM THE BOARD continued

Chapter Audit/Financial Review (Vickie Minor) Vickie Minor and Gary Weber conducted a review on February 12. The books and entries were in excellent shape and all but one of the 2018 recommendations were implemented. The two issues encountered in 2019 related to the PayPal fees and how they are reported. The treasurer's report has been modified to include the information in the "Notes" box at the bottom of the report. Vickie noted that Tim is doing a great job as treasurer.

Spring Inventories (Vickie Minor) At the January meeting, we agreed to inventory all property at the gardens, the soil thermometers and row cover, before opening day. Vickie will send PDF versions of the inventories to all project coordinators. Since there have been sales already of row cover and thermometers, Vickie will work with Rocky and Diana on reconciling their inventories against the final numbers reported for 2019. JoAnne reported that she and Elizabeth reviewed the TA boxes this week and corrected the inventory sheets for soil thermometers, so the sheets in the TA boxes should be correct. Diana reported that she ordered 100 more thermometers.

Open forum (anyone) Diana offered 2 tickets to the Redmond concert series, set for Sunday, at 6:30 at Ridgeview HS. Lea Dahlen took them.

Rocky asked about COMGA getting a credit card so she can charge row cover instead of personally paying and being reimbursed. Discussion followed. Vickie and Tim will research the types of payment methods the company will accept. Tim noted that if a company will send an invoice, he can pay that directly so the buyer does not have to use personal funds. No decisions were made about getting a credit card.

PROJECT STATUS REPORTS:

Community Education (Elizabeth Weide) The first community vegetable class is tonight in Redmond, in the classroom. Eventbrite is being used to manage the registrations so we know how many people are attending. 80 people are registered and more than 30 are waitlisted. Classes are full in Bend and Redmond but people can still go to Sisters or Prineville. There will be a sealed box at the classes for donations, which will go to OSU. There will be separate envelopes for row cover and soil thermometer sales, which go to COMGA. At the end of each class, the sealed donation box goes directly to Carrie. The envelopes should be completed and given to Tim. TA training will be March 13; Elizabeth, Vickie and JoAnne are the instructors. 12 MGs and 13 trainees are scheduled to attend. Amy Jo asked that the class evaluations be updated so they capture information she needs for the annual reports she submits to OSU. The long form is done and is with Amy Jo for approval. The short form has not been revised yet. Since the evaluations are for community classes, copy costs should be charged to OSU, not COMGA. Elizabeth met last week with Jan Even, Mary Ann Hart, Nancy Glick and Diana Hardin, to sort through publicity responsibilities. She developed a chart that

explains who is responsible for which types of publicity. There was a vibrant discussion on the various social media options and how people are learning about the classes.

Discovery Park Community Garden (Gary Weber) The construction work to install the sewer connection next to the garden, is complete. A section of fence was temporarily removed but otherwise, the garden beds were not disturbed. This year, lottery applications are being monitored by Johanna Talus, who will log applicants and send them introductory and background information. Interested people can apply by sending an email to gocomga@gmail.com. 20 trainees and 3 certified MG's have indicated interest in volunteering. There are also 5 returning volunteers. Gary still needs more certified MGs to be garden mentors. Janet Dart is working on Opening Day registration, and rodent defense will be a major activity again this year. There will be some workshops for volunteers to learn how to build an effective cloche. In the process, work will continue on repairing and bringing the rest of the garden beds up to a higher standard of functioning. Ultimately, the goal is to make the garden as rewarding and educational as possible, for both gardeners and volunteers.

Hollinshead Community Garden (Nancy Glick) 13 trainees signed up at the project fair. There are 90 plots, two-thirds of the gardeners are returning and there are 5 openings right now. Nancy expects the garden plots to be full again this year. Orientation is April 4 in the Brooks room at the downtown library. Nancy needs more mentors, especially MGs who live in Bend. Elizabeth is interested but wants more information what the mentors do. Nancy will get that information to her.

Home and Garden Show (Vickie Minor) There will be eight classes, with vegetable gardening offered each day of the event. Set up will be April 30, the plant clinic will run May 1-3. Only certified MGs will be in the plant clinic, but trainees will be helping with the classes. Tablets will be available for the plant clinic, along with Wi-Fi access so we can get to the internet. The expectation is that if we can answer the questions or solve the problems, we should. Only the most complicated problems should be forwarded to the office for resolution.

June Garden Fair (Vicky Kemp) The postcards are in and are available for the veggie classes, spring seminar and the Home & Garden Show. As of March 4, Vicky has scheduled the seed sowing and transplanting classes, which are full. Tomatoes will arrive a few days ahead of time and will be sold in the pots as delivered. Vicky will send a request soon for volunteers the day of the event. 84 people have offered to help and many are already assigned to tasks. She will need approximately 50 people the day of the event. Discussion followed on the budget, so the board was aware of the differences between the original forecast and current projections for expenses and income. The original budget request was made before the project review committee issued their report. Vicky implemented many of the recommendations this year and as she got more specific costs (e.g., perennials, tomatoes, etc.), she amended the budget. She advised the board that as things stand now, the difference between the original budget and the amended budget is only a few dollars. Once the event is over, she will have final numbers.

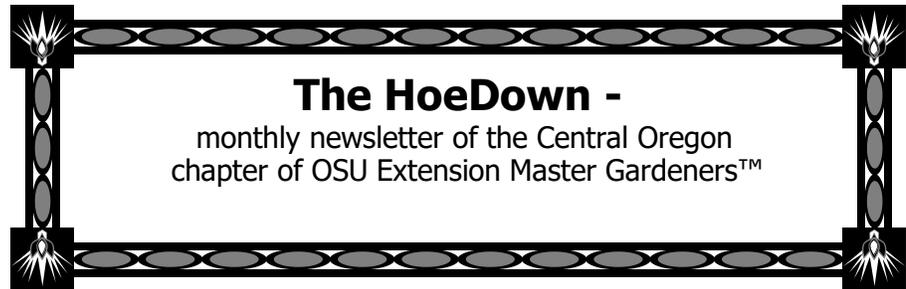
